In addition, there are local LGBTQIA2S+ centers in many communities, as well as bars, nightclubs, and other "gathering places." Seek out safe havens, but beware of those who would prey upon you. (Sorry if I get a little heavy here. Know that I care about all of you!)

Pride Safety!

Travel in groups—there is power (and safety) in numbers.

Have an exit strategy or plan in case things go sideways.

Determine an emergency meet-up spot in case you get separated from your group.

Follow instructions from event organizers and law enforcement.

Stay hydrated and pack essentials like sunscreen.

Look out for each other—enable Find My or another location app for the day so everyone in your

group can keep track of one another.

Set regular times to check in with your group. If you spread out, plan to text or check-in every hour or so.

Trust your instincts. If something or someone seems off, get out of the situation as quickly as you can.

Practice inclusivity and respect—for Pride participants and even detractors.

Resist the urge to engage in

aggressive language, shouting, or other interactions.

If you're drinking alcohol, don't overindulge, don't accept an open drink,
and don't leave your drink unattended.

Enjoy celebrating!

A fellow author, Vee Debras, wrote a piece that I asked to quote, and she graciously permitted:

"So hey, whoever you are right now reading this, I see you. I remember you. I believe in you all year round. I hope you can do the same for me.

What I intended to give you in this email before my demons showed up was these six loving reminders for this Pride Month. I hope you can get something out of them.

- It's okay if you haven't figured yourself out yet, no matter your age, no matter if you thought you already had.
- You are exactly who you know you are, even if people doubt you, and even if you doubt yourself sometimes.
- The only way you "should look like" is the way you look.
- You're not invisible, they've closed their eyes (but they aren't blind).
- You deserve to be celebrated, so celebrate yourself.
- I don't need to know you to love you. Thank you for existing for another day."



For those of you born since 2000, you may not even know WHY we "celebrate" Pride in June (and, in fact, many locations have changed the dates due to weather and other concerns). So, a quick history lesson. Pride was born from the Stonewall Uprising, which occurred after New York City police raided the Stonewall Inn on June 28, 1969, due to accusations of illegal liquor licenses. Employees and customers were arrested or detained for incidental charges, as had happened on previous occasions. This time, however, the gay community - for it was mostly gays who patronized the bar retaliated. What began as a violent show of flying bottles, insults, and trash resulted in the bar catching fire. The uprising lasted five days. The Gay Rights Movement was born. In 2016, the Stonewall Inn and the surrounding areas were officially registered as a national monument, and on the occasion of the 50th anniversary in 2019, the New York Police Department Commissioner issued a public apology. When you hear that Pride was a protest, now you know why.

GAY PRIDE WAS NOT BORN OF A NEED TO CELEBRATE BEING GAY, BUT OUR RIGHT TO EXIST WITHOUT PERSECUTION. SO INSTEAD OF WONDERING WHY THERE ISN'T A STRAIGHT PRIDE MOVEMENT, BE THANKFUL YOU DON'T NEED ONE.
